## **Upcoming Meeting Speakers**

Our new support group representative from Takeda, Rebekah Tobin will be presenting at the May 16<sup>th</sup> meeting. "Understanding Lab Values" will be her topic for this meeting.

Dr Timothy Schmidt will be joining us at the July meeting. More info to follow. Hoping to get him to talk about his clinical trials.

Dr Aric Hall will be out featured speaker for the April 18<sup>th</sup> meeting. He will do his usual Q & A and start at 4:30pm.

During the support group meeting, there has been some conversation around IVIG. Here is an explanation of what it is all about.

Intravenous Immunoglobulin (IVIG) is a product made from antibodies collected from the plasma of healthy individuals. The antibodies are proteins that help fight infections and are part of the blood's plasma. The plasma is collected from 10,000 to 50,000 individuals with normal immune systems and is then given intravenously through a vein to help strengthen the recipient's immune system and fight infections. IVIG is used in multiple conditions, including immune

deficiencies, autoimmune diseases, and some neurological conditions. IVIG can be administered intravenously, subcutaneously, or intramuscular. For myeloma patients, IVIG is usually administered every three to four weeks at a dose of 0.4 grams per kilogram. The frequency of IVIG administration may vary based on the individual's steady state levels of immunoglobulin.

## Support The Safe Step Act- IMF Advocacy works continues...

A bipartisan group of Senators reintroduced S. 652, the Safe Step Act, which helps patients access drugs more quickly when their doctors seek exceptions to step therapy. As you may know, step therapy is when a patient's insurance company requires them to try less expensive drugs before moving onto pricier options. The bill establishes a process requiring a group health plan to respond to a physician's request in a timely manner while also outlining guardrails surrounding the usage of step therapy.

Why this is important: The bill ensures that patients can access their medications more quickly when step therapy is used and that step therapy protocols do not ignore the individual needs of patients. With myeloma being such a heterogeneous and diverse condition, it is extremely important that each individual's unique medical history is taken into account.
